## They talked about the printing skills that they enjoyed and which they preferred.









Big eyebrows Bright colours Animals







We used blocks to start with. Then we used foil and acetate. We added printing ink and drew self portraits in the ink. Lastly, we used foam and carved our picture into the foam to create a mono print using one colour.





Year Three and Four studied the artist Picasso. They explored watercolours and drawing skills to produce a self portrait in a picasso style.





Spring I (week 3) – We explored the abstract work from the American artist Kenneth Noland.

We compared two pieces of his art and made a colour wheel using primary and secondary colours.








The children learned how to print using foam and layering techniques. They used different textures of paper and different colours to produce a printed background.

We are artists!



We believe that high-quality Art lessons will inspire children to think innovatively and develop creative procedural understanding. Our Art curriculum provides children with opportunities to develop their skills using a range of media and materials. Children learn the skills of drawing, painting, printing, collage, textiles, 3D work and digital art and are given the opportunity to explore and evaluate different creative ideas. Children are introduced to a range of works and develop knowledge of the styles and vocabulary used by famous artists. The skills they acquire are applied to their cross-curricular topics, allowing children to use their art skills to reflect on and explore topics in greater depth.

Art contributes to children's personal development in creativity, independence, judgment and self-reflection. It also enables them to create take care work which links strongly to our school values. It is paramount that artwork be purposeful; be this as a means of expression or to explore the styles of other artists that inspire our own work. In Art, children are expected to be reflective and evaluate their work, thinking about how they can make changes and keep improving. Children are encouraged to take risks and experiment and then reflect on why some ideas and techniques are successful or not for a particular project.
