Reading

1 – Read the first chapter of Roald Dahl's '**Danny the Champion of the World**' on this link . Look out for any words and phrases which describe Danny and his Dad's home. Can you draw and colour a picture of it using the information you have gathered from the setting description? You can listen to the story for free here

2 – Listen to the Prologue of 'The Boy who Made the World Disappear' on this link. <https://www.worldbookday.com/stories/the-boy-who-made-the-world-disappear-by-ben-miller/> Listen once for fun. When you listen a second time, make a note of the things the author tells you about Harrison's character. Can you fill the **person outline** with information about Harrison? If you enjoyed the beginning of the story – you can listen to the whole book!

3 - Read for at least 20 minutes every day this week. Choose one of the **alternative book review** activities to complete.

Writing

1 – Can you write a setting description in the style of Roald Dahl? You could choose your favourite room in your home, your garden or the whole place!

2 – Choose a favourite character from a book or a person you know really well. Draw an outline on a piece of paper – can you write a description of them inside it? Remember to use lots of descriptive language.

3. Look at the Pobble 365 task – **Isolation**. You could write a setting description of the house or use the story starter.

If you would prefer, you could continue to work through the Talk for Writing Booklet from last week or write something else of your own choosing.

Whole School Project for all ages:

Our learning this week is all about 'Houses and Homes'. **You can showcase your learning however you wish!**

Here are some ideas to help you to focus your learning or you could come up with a list of your own questions that you want to investigate:

- Safety in the home is incredibly important. Work through the **Fire Safety at Home Booklet**. There are also activities to explore on these links <http://www.switchedonkids.org.uk/electrical-safety-in-your-home> and <http://www.essex-fire.gov.uk/homesafety/> Design a leaflet using words and images to warn people about dangers around the home
- Running a home isn't cheap. Lots of you will have already come across Money Sense in our lessons in school. They have lots of interesting, interactive resources which you can access at home too. <https://natwest.mymoneysense.com/home-learning/>
- Can you draw a floor plan of your house? If that's too easy, you could measure your rooms and make sure that you draw them to scale.
- Can you create a map of your room? Use a key so that we know what each item is.
- Do a survey of the types of house in your street – terrace, semi-detached, detached, cottage, apartment etc. You could collect information in a tally chart and then present you findings in a bar chart. Remember to tell us what you found out.
- Could you create a map of your immediate locality? Make sure you include important landmarks (e.g. post boxes, traffic lights) and a key. You could draw a grid over the top and use co-ordinates to locate items.
- What would be in your ideal home? We love the 13-Storey Treehouse books – let your imagination run wild and create the home of your dreams on a detailed diagram, then write a description of it as if you were an estate agent planning to sell it to someone!
- Does your home have an interesting history? Can you find out anything about the people who have lived there in the past?
- Use your artistic skills to bring a home to life – build a model from lego or junk, sketch or paint your home or go crazy with a collage of your ideal home or room.
- How many bricks do you think it took to build your house? How could you work this out?
- We know you love your Geography, so why not focus on Yorkshire and find out all about your home county? What are the major landscapes, landmarks and cities. How many Yorkshire rivers can you name? (SUNWAC might help you!) Why is it known as 'God's own country'?

Definition: If you outsmart someone, you defeat them or gain an advantage over them in a clever and sometimes dishonest way.

Phrases: *easily outsmarted* *outsmarted again*

Word of the Day: **reward** Word Class (noun / verb)

Pronunciation / Syllables (re-ward)

Definition: A reward is something that you are given, for example because you have behaved well, worked hard, or provided a service to the community.

Joel was **rewarded** for his excellent efforts.

Phrases: *was rewarded by* *was rewarded for*
can be very rewarding

Word of the Day: **duel** Word Class (noun / verb)

Pronunciation / Syllables (duel)

Definition: A duel is a formal fight between two people in which they use guns or swords in order to settle a quarrel.

The twins **duelled** over the ball.

Phrases: *duel at dawn* *the duel was between*

Word of the Day: **rickety** Word Class (adjective)

Pronunciation / Syllables (rick-et-y)

Definition: A rickety structure or piece of furniture is not very strong or well made, and seems likely to collapse or break.

Mr Jones' car seemed a little old and **rickety**.

Phrases: *old and rickety* *it was extremely rickety*

Word of the Day: **loom** Word Class (verb)

Pronunciation / Syllables (loom)

Definition: If something looms over you, it appears as a large or unclear shape, often in a frightening way.

The teacher **loomed** over the children during the test.

Phrases: *loomed over* *looming over*
